In January, I discussed a few of the important DSCU legislative mandates in the FY2024 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) Section 1204. In this issue, I would like to continue that discussion and show you how the University is evolving to address future Security Cooperation challenges and opportunities by addressing the NDAA and National Defense Strategy (NDS) initiatives.

In the "Special Feature" and "Accountability" sections, you will find how DSCU is managing and provisioning Institutional Capacity Building (ICB); updating Security Cooperation Organization (SCO) personnel learning experiences with the creation of the Defense Security Cooperation Organization Institute (DSI); and establishing a Foreign Military Sales (FMS) Center of Excellence, the soon to be FMS Academy.

The progressive roll out of <u>Certification 2.0</u> for the Security Cooperation Workforce (SCW) remains one of my top priorities. We are actively refining the management, training, and education of the 15,000+ member SCW through Certification 2.0 and the establishment of the SCW Human Capital Initiative, per the NDAA, which will facilitate strategic workforce planning and data-driven analysis of the workforce. The School of Security Cooperation Studies (SSCS) and College of Strategic Security Cooperation (CSSC) teams are building 65+ new courses to vastly improve the quality of training and education courseware and programming for the SCW. DSCU will be hosting multiple collaborative events this year. # **Special Feature: DSCU Responds to Legislation**

DSCU is evolving to answer legislative mandates and prepare for future Security Cooperation strategic realities. The FY2024 NDAA Section 1204 provisions make strong investments in the SCW and DSCU as the center of intellectual life for the Security Cooperation enterprise. DSCU's long-term objective is to make Security Cooperation more effective through a full-spectrum approach; to ensure the consistent evolution of SCW training and education programs, which address national defense and foreign policy objectives, and build effective alliances and partnerships.

#### **Institutional Capacity Building**

In the FY2024 NDAA, DSCU is tasked with the "management and provision of Institutional Capacity Building (ICB) services executed by the DOD." ICB encompasses Security Cooperation activities that support Partner Nation efforts to establish or improve enduring policies and processes to plan, develop, resource, acquire, staff, employ, and sustain capabilities of mutual benefit to respond to shared challenges. ICB programing focuses on enhancing institutional functions, which are critical long-term enablers of many security capabilities and further U.S.—partner shared priorities.

The legislation bolsters DSCU's existing ICB mission and brings additional importance to DSCU's ICB elements and implementing components including: the ICB Directorate, the Institute for Security Governance (ISG), the Defense Institute of International Legal Studies (DIILS), and the Ministry of Defense Advisors (MoDA) program.

#### **DSCU's ICB Directorate**

Established in 2022, DSCU's ICB Directorate is the leading proponent for ICB, oversees the 10 U.S.C. Section 332 ICB and Section 1208 Women, Peace, and Security (WPS) authorities, and manages DSCU's MoDA program. Key efforts include:

- Partnering with DSCA and DSCU components, the ICB Directorate leads ICB planning and resourcing, strengthens stakeholder collaboration, and enables ICB to be more effective within current Security Cooperation planning processes.
- Completing DSCU's first ICB professionalization program and undertaking next steps to shape the ICB subsection of the SCW as part of National Defense Strategy Implementation initiatives.
- Developing a collaborative DSCU ICB knowledge and data management approach and hub.
- Leading DSCU's MoDA program. Learn more about the MoDA Program and MoDA Detailee Opportunities.
- Standing-up the 10 U.S.C. Section 1208 WPS planning and resourcing processes, including becoming DSCA's WPS office of responsibility and leading the Security Cooperation WPS sub-working group.

## Foreign Military Sales Academy

Section 1204 of the FY2024 NDAA outlines the establishment of an FMS Center of Excellence, the soon to be FMS Academy, within DSCU. The legislation directs this to be a DOD educational institution with the requisite expertise in FMS and in education, training, research and analysis of the SCW. The FMS Academy will serve as the DOD's FMS Center of Excellence to improve the training and education of personnel engaged in FMS planning and execution.

The FMS Academy's objectives will include:

- Conducting research on and promoting best practices to ensure FMS processes are timely and effective.
- Enhancing existing curricula for the purpose of ensuring that the FMS workforce is fully trained and prepared to execute the FMS program.

## **Accountability: Defense Security Cooperation Organization Institute**

DSCU holds itself accountable to a higher standard of Security Cooperation education and practice by building and using evidence-based knowledge to inform DSCU's operations, curriculum, and teaching methodologies.

Prescribed by 10 U.S.C. Section 384 and revised in the FY2024 NDAA Section 1204, DSCU is mandated to ensure that those who represent the DOD to partner nations are a professionalized force with the training and support necessary to advance national security objectives. Therefore, DSCU is holding itself accountable by ensuring the next generation of Security

Cooperation Organization (SCO) personnel receive the education, training, and support they deserve to succeed in challenging and dynamic assignments.

DSCU's new Defense SCO Institute (DSI) will serve as the DOD SCO schoolhouse, which will provide pre-assignment preparation essential for SCO personnel. Recognizing that SCO personnel are the primary representatives for Security Cooperation in their aligned country. DSI will offer bespoke education and training to SCO personnel. DSI intends to strengthen the way in which SCO personnel are prepared for their unique scope of responsibilities by offering new educational



opportunities targeted toward preparation for activities such as strategic planning, cross functional collaboration, and improving agility needed to keep up with the pace of the evolving field of Security Cooperation.

DSCU's DSI will adopt a unique approach to SCO education. DSI aims to tailor SCO educational programming to ensure all SCO personnel receive:

- Country-specific training
- Education in strategic planning, program management, and partner advising
- Reach back support while on assignment

In preparation for the opening of DSI in FY25, Dr. Celeste Gyenter, DSCU President, chaired an interagency discussion in February 2024, where participants discussed support needed for SCO personnel success. Beginning in March 2024, DSCU began meeting with key stakeholders, including combatant commands, to collect their perspectives on the most important duties carried out by SCO personnel, and identify educational requirements. These stakeholder perspectives will inform evolving DSI curriculum, tools, and resources and help ensure alignment with critical mission needs.
