Foreign Military Sales Symposium: Professionalization of the Workforce and the Promise of Security Cooperation

May 23-24, 2024



The Honorable Cara L. Abercrombie Assistant Secretary of Defense for Acquisition

Ms. Cara Abercrombie was confirmed as the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Acquisition (ASD(A)) on February 27, 2024. In this position, she advises the Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition and Sustainment (USD(A&S)), the Deputy Secretary of Defense, and the Secretary of Defense on matters relating to the Department of Defense (DoD) Acquisition System, acquisition program management, and the development of strategic, space, intelligence, tactical warfare, command and control, and business systems.

From 2021-2023, Ms. Abercrombie served as Deputy Assistant to the President and Coordinator for Defense Policy and Arms Control on the National Security Council. Prior to this position, she was the Acting Deputy Director of the Defense Security Cooperation Agency (DSCA). In this position, she oversaw the organization's

diverse portfolio of Security Cooperation programs and worked with external stakeholders to synchronize DSCA activities with foreign policy and national security objectives. Additionally, she was the first President of the Defense Security Cooperation University (DSCU) and Principal Director for Workforce Development. She was responsible for overseeing the professional development and certification of the 15,000+ civilian and military members of the DoD security cooperation workforce; and the training of other DoD, U.S. Government, defense industry and foreign partner personnel who perform related functions.

Ms. Abercrombie was a career member of the Senior Executive Service with two decades of experience working in the Office of the Secretary of Defense.

Previously, she was detailed from the Department of Defense as a visiting fellow with the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace from 2017 to 2018, where she published numerous articles on U.S.- India defense relations. As Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for South and Southeast Asia from 2016-2017, Ms. Abercrombie served as the principal advisor to senior Department leadership for all policy matters pertaining to development and implementation of defense strategies and plans for the region. She was responsible for managing the bilateral security relationships with nations of that region and guiding Department of Defense engagement with regional multilateral institutions.

Her previous positions in the Department have included Principal Director for East Asia Policy, Special Assistant to the Secretary of Defense, Director for South Asia, Human Capital Strategy Advisor to the Under Secretary for Policy, Defense Institution Building Coordinator, and Senior Country Director for India. She joined the Department as a Presidential Management Fellow in 2003. Prior to entering government, Ms. Abercrombie was a Program Officer for Eurasia with the National Democratic Institute for International Affairs.

A graduate of Dartmouth College, Ms. Abercrombie holds a Master's degree in Public and International Affairs from Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School. She is a 2022 recipient of the Presidential Rank Award of Distinguished Executive, numerous Defense Meritorious Civilian Service Awards, and the Department of State Meritorious Honor Award.



Mr. Glenn E. Anderson III Deputy Assistant Director for Financial Policy and Regional Execution, Defense Security Cooperation Agency

Glenn Anderson is the Deputy Assistant Director for Financial Policy and Regional Execution. In this role he has led the U.S. Inter-Agency including OMB, State, Treasury, and DoD in developing competitive finance tools to provide our international partners with multiple new means of financing foreign military sales. He is responsible for ensuring the security cooperation community executes Title 10 (DoD) and Title 22 (DoS) programs in accordance with fiscal laws and regulations. Mr. Anderson is responsible for maintaining the health of all international partner trust funds at the U.S. Treasury and the Federal Reserve Bank. He is also responsible for maintaining the health of the FMS Administrative trust fund used to execute the FMS program for the entire security cooperation community. Mr. Anderson is also responsible for all security cooperation financial

policy, as well as Congressional reporting and compliance.

Prior to his current role, Mr. Anderson was the Branch Chief for INDOPACOM and EUCOM country financial management. In this role, he ensured country finance directors executed sustainable country financial strategies that protect and optimize partners' funds while ensuring the solvency of their programs. Mr. Anderson partnered with Ministry of Defense-level and Ministry of Finance-level counterparts and serves as the conduit for partner country inquiries into the U.S. financial system.

Prior to joining country financial management, Mr. Anderson was a financial policy analyst in the Financial Policy and Analysis Division, Business Operations Directorate, Defense Security Cooperation Agency. He developed and implemented security cooperation financial policy for all Military Departments. Mr. Anderson was the lead for all foreign military sales financial concerns as well as commercial banking arrangements, special billing arrangements, standby letters of credit, pre counter-signature reviews, cash management, case reviews, leases, nonrecurring recoupment waivers and calculations, and supply discrepancy reports. He ensured all DoD Security Cooperation financial policies are consistent with National Security Strategy, legislation, and Department of Defense directives and procedures. He was also the lead for ensuring the health of the Foreign Military Sales administrative trust fund and was the financial team lead for the Special Defense Acquisition Fund.

Mr. Anderson joined DSCA in 2011 after ten years in the Department of the Air Force. After joining the Air Force as a civilian he worked in multiple roles such as manpower, financial management, contracting, and information technology services. Immediately prior to joining DSCA Mr. Anderson was the Deputy Chief, Security Assistance Policy and International Training and Education Division, Policy Directorate, Deputy Under Secretary of the Air Force, International Affairs. He was responsible for all Air Force Security Cooperation policy and implemented policy concerning all international flight training and Professional Military Education. He was also responsible for all Air Force international training to include flight training, maintenance, English language training, and all instruction provided internationally.



Ms. Melissa K. Benkert

Director – Planning, Programs and Analysis, Office of the Under Secretary of Defense (Acquisition and Sustainment) International Cooperation

Melissa Benkert is the Director for Planning, Programs and Analysis (PPA) in the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition and Sustainment (A&S). PPA is the Department of Defense focal point for the authorization of international agreements for research, development, production, acquisition, and logistics support. Seeking to foster greater international cooperation, PPA administers the Coalition Warfare Program and the Defense Exportability Features Program. Ms. Benkert serves as the A&S lead for technology transfer and export control issues and is a member of the National Disclosure Policy Committee.

Previously, Ms. Benkert served as the Associate Director for International and Inter agency Programs in the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense (Comptroller), where she provided oversight and management for a complex set of authorities and appropriations associated with the Department's international support programs, including the Afghan Security Forces Fund, support for Coalition Forces deployed in support of U.S. military operations, and partner capacity building.

From 2000-2010, Ms. Benkert served as a research analyst at the Center for Naval Analyses (CNA), a Federally Funded Research and Development Center. She conducted research and analysis on issues ranging from DoD's Partnership for Peace programs to carrier air wing support for Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom and served as CNA's deployed representative to the Commander, Enterprise Carrier Strike Group. In addition, Ms. Benkert served as the Special Assistant and Advisor to the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Global Security Affairs and as the Director for Ministerial Development in the Defense Reconstruction Support Office.

Ms. Benkert's other experience includes work as an arms control analyst supporting program offices at the Departments of Defense and Energy and seven years at the Atlantic Council of the United States. She served as the Atlantic Council's Director for Planning and as the Deputy Director for Civil-Military Relations, leading a training program for senior officials in Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union.

Ms. Benkert was promoted to the Senior Executive Service in 2012. She is a recipient of the Secretary of Defense Medal for Outstanding Public Service. Ms. Benkert earned an M.A. in Security Policy Studies from the George Washington University and received her B.A. in Political Science and History from Creighton University.

Deputy Program Executive Officer for Mobility Aircraft, Mobility and Training Aircraft Directorate, Air Force Life Cycle Management Center

Mr. Boyd is the Deputy Program Executive Officer (DPEO) for Mobility Aircraft, Mobility and Training Aircraft Directorate, Air Force Life Cycle Management Center, Robins Air Force Base, Georgia. He is responsible for acquisition, modernization and sustainment of the USAF's and partner nations' C-5, C-17, C-130, KC-10, KC-135, and KC-46 fleets. He works closely with each weapon system Program Office and the corresponding Warfighter communities within Air Mobility Command, Air National Guard, and Air Force Reserve Command, to ensure safe, available, and effective systems to meet national security requirements.

Mr. Boyd's career has included dynamic broadening experiences as an aircraft and munitions maintenance officer at one of the most active flying units in the Air Force, as well as time instructing the next generation of Air Force leaders in the Reserve Officer Training Corps program. He is certified as a Level III Program Manager in the Acquisition Professional Development Program, and has managed an ACAT IAC program into sustainment. He was hand-selected as the executive officer for the 3-star Electronic Systems Center Commander and Program Executive Officer for Command and Control and Combat Support systems. Mr. Boyd was deployed in 2010 as the Deputy J7 on the US Forces – Afghanistan staff in Kabul, Afghanistan. Mr. Boyd retired as a Lieutenant Colonel effective 31 January 2012 after almost 22 years of active commissioned service in the United States Air Force. His first assignment as a civil servant was the C-130 Foreign Military Sales Branch Chief.




Dr. Julie Chalfin

Deputy Director and Chief, Security Forces Capacity Building Division, Political Military Bureau's Office of Global Programs and Initiatives, U.S. Department of State

Dr. Julie Chalfin is the Deputy Director, and Chief of the Security Forces Capacity Building Division, in the U.S. Department of State's Political Military Bureau's Office of Global Programs and Initiatives (PM/GPI) in Washington. She oversees PM/GPI's mission to improve security sector governance and institutional capacity through foreign assistance and partnerships. Prior to joining PM, Dr. Chalfin was the Chief of Staff for the interagency Security Governance Initiative (SGI) housed in State's Africa Bureau where she coordinated efforts to align partner nation security priorities with U.S. national interests, resources, and expertise, and focused on enhancing the governance of security and justice sectors. She previously worked with African security forces to develop strategies and policies to reform security

institutions in post conflict environments. Prior to her work in the Africa Bureau, Dr. Chalfin was an American Association for the Advancement of Science diplomacy fellow in the Office of the Coordinator for Reconstruction and Stabilization at the Department of State.

Before coming to the Department of State, Dr. Chalfin worked for several international non-governmental organizations, including Save the Children, the Carter Center, and the International Rescue Committee. She conducted research as a post-doctoral fellow at the University of Pennsylvania's Solomon Asch Center for Study of Ethno-political Conflict and earned her Ph.D. in Social Psychology from Claremont Graduate University where she researched international conflict management. She is also a graduate of the National Defense University's Eisenhower School for National Security and Resource Strategy where she earned a master's degree in National Resource Strategy.



Mr. Paul Cormarie Policy Analyst, RAND

Paul Cormarie is a policy analyst in RAND's Washington D.C. office. His research focuses on NATO, the European Union, and transatlantic relations; force planning and defense modernization; and security cooperation. Previously, Cormarie was a Researcher at the NATO Parliamentary Assembly, where he wrote reports on the Alliance and in other topics related to European security, as well as an assistant to the Emeritus Chair in Strategy Dr. Anthony Cordesman of CSIS. Prior to these roles, he has also been affiliated with the Atlantic Council, the EU Delegation to the United States, the United Nations, and the UK Department for International Trade. Laura Cressey, a member of the Senior Executive Service, is the Director of the Office of Regional Security and Arms Transfers in the State Department's Bureau of Political Military Affairs. She joined the office in 2013, serving as Team Lead for Europe and Western Hemisphere, Deputy Director, and Acting Director until she was appointed Director in 2021. She is responsible for overseeing in excess of \$50 billion in annual worldwide arms transfers; developing global and country- and technology-specific arms transfer policies; managing global regional security issues; and conducting multiple political-military dialogues around the world. She has been the Bureau lead on strengthening and improving partnerships with U.S. industry to advance foreign policy and national security goals.

For ten years, Laura worked on nonproliferation issues in the Department of State. As the Deputy Director for the Office of Chemical, Biological, and Missile Nonproliferation, she was in charge of U.S. chemical and biological weapons nonproliferation policy and related export controls. Laura joined the Department of State as a Presidential Management Intern in 1992.

Laura worked in the private sector for Booz Allen Hamilton, consulting on a variety of defense and intelligence issues, and for Georgetown University advising graduate students on careers in the international sector. Her book, Careers in International Affairs, 9th edition, was published in 2014. She received her M.S. in Foreign Service from Georgetown University and a B.A. in International Affairs and History from Tufts University. She resides in Northern Virginia and has two daughters.



Mr. David Ferrari

Assistant Director for Strategy, Plans, and Policy, Defense Security Cooperation Agency

David Ferrari serves as the DSCA Assistant Director (AD) for Strategy, Plans, and Policy (SPP), where he has responsibility over all Security Cooperation planning activity within the Agency. His portfolio includes Building Partner Capacity planning using the Significant Security Cooperation Initiative process, designing programs to meet required partner capabilities. He is also responsible for incorporating strategic initiatives into Security Cooperation, including Climate Resiliency; Women, Peace, and Security; Cybersecurity; and Space, among others. As AD SPP, he has oversight of all Foreign Military Sales (FMS) policy development, including the Security Assistance Management Manual, multinational FMS, and DSCA efforts to project partner nation FMS demand.

Mr. Ferrari is a native of Deer Park, New York. After graduating from the Georgetown University School of Foreign Service in 1992, he began his Security Cooperation career with Veda, Inc., supporting the United States Naval Air Systems Command, E-2/C-2 Program Office (PMA-231) while earning his Master's Degree in National Security, also from Georgetown, in 1996. In 1998, he joined the consulting practice of KPMG Peat Marwick, providing Foreign Military Sales (FMS) and International Armaments Cooperation support to various clients, including the United States Naval Sea Systems Command (NAVSEA) and the United States Air Force Security Assistance Center. He was promoted to Senior Manager in 2000 and led the firm's FMS/Security Cooperation business unit, with 35 professionals and more than \$5 million in annual revenue. In 2009, he joined Deloitte Consulting and contributed to a firm-wide business development strategy anticipating the shift to International Financial Reporting Standards in various markets in North and South America.

Mr. Ferrari joined the civil service in 2011, serving as the Deputy Director and then Director of the NAVSEA International Security Assistance Office (ISAO). While at ISAO, he had direct oversight of \$30 billion in FMS

operations and responsibility over \$70 million in FMS Administrative and Contract Administrative Services budgets. He also served as an instructor for the NAVSEA FMS Case Management Excellence program. In 2016, he joined the International Armaments Cooperation team in the Office of the Undersecretary of Defense (Acquisition, Technology and Logistics) as a Country Desk Officer where he was responsible for international armaments cooperation across his portfolio of partner nations. He joined DSCA in 2017 in the Chief Performance Office, where he was responsible for developing functional requirements across the Security Cooperation enterprise for future Foreign Military Sales case execution automation before becoming Chief of Staff in 2020, with responsibility over Front Office operations, strategic communications, and legislative affairs, until his appointment as AD SPP in November 2022.



Mr. Alan Gorowitz Senior Strategy Advisor, Defense Security Cooperation Agency

Alan Gorowitz serves as Senior Strategy Advisor, providing analysis and recommendations regarding the DoD security cooperation enterprise in the context of DoD strategy, future scenarios, and emerging trends. He serves as a Senior Leader, supporting the DSCA leadership team.

Mr. Gorowitz has served for over 20 years in the Department of Defense security cooperation community. He began his Department of Defense career in 2000 at the George C. Marshall European Center for Security Studies in Germany, supporting partner defense reform and strategy development through advising, conferences and seminars, and national security professional networks. Returning to the U.S. in 2007, he served in the Office of the Secretary of Defense (Policy) for over ten years providing policy advice and oversight including assignments as Director, Counterterrorism Partnerships; Chief of Staff and Director, Partnership Policy and Strategy; and

Domestic Terrorism and Cyber Threat Information Sharing Coordinator. In 2017, he was detailed from Policy to DSCA to stand up a Planning and Program Design team.

He joined DSCA in 2018 as Assistant Director for Strategy, Plans, and Policy (SPP), facilitating strategic planning, leading security cooperation administration and execution policy, and promoting comprehensive security cooperation planning and program design.

Prior to Federal Service, Mr. Gorowitz served at the Center for International Strategy, Technology, and Policy (CISTP), Sam Nunn School of International Affairs, Georgia Institute of Technology.

Mr. Gorowitz is a graduate of the National War College. His awards include the Office of the Secretary of Defense Award for Exceptional Service (3), the OSD Achievement Award, and the Department of the Army Award for Superior Civilian Service.

Dr. Gventer assumed duties as the President of the Defense Security Cooperation University (DSCU), a component of the Defense Security Cooperation Agency (DSCA), in December 2021. DSCU's mission is to advance the knowledge and practice of Security Cooperation through the education, training, and development of the U.S. Security Cooperation workforce and through the education, training, and institutional capacity building of partner nations; and to produce research, analysis, and lessons learned that expand the intellectual foundations of Security Cooperation.

Dr. Gventer has been a national security professional for more than two decades with service in government, academia, and the private sector, both in the United States and overseas. Before this assignment, she served as a Senior Lecturer and Regional

Program Lead for Europe at DSCU's Institute for Security Governance. From 2007 to 2009, Dr. Gventer served as the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Stability Operations Capabilities in the Office of the Secretary of Defense in Washington, D.C. For part of that time, she was 'dual-hatted' as the Acting Principal Deputy to the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Special Operations Capabilities. She joined the DoD following her second tour of duty in Iraq, where she was the political-military advisor to the Multinational Corps-Iraq commander from 2005 to 2006.

Mr. Aaron Harding Cheif Operating Officer and Chief Financial Officer DSCA

Mr. Aaron Harding serves as the DSCA Chief Financial Officer and is the senior executive overseeing all DSCA financial operations including financial policy, audit readiness, and financial reporting. In this capacity, he is responsible for managing financial aspects of the Foreign Military Sales program and Foreign Military Sales Trust Fund with a total program value of over half a trillion dollars, to include the Foreign Military Financing Program. Additionally, he is responsible for oversight of the programming, budgeting, financial execution, and reporting for a variety of security cooperation programs.

Mr. Harding joined the DSCA in 2013 as the Comptroller responsible for all financial operations and audit readiness activities. In this capacity, Mr. Harding led the successful migration from two separate legacy accounting systems to the

Department's Defense Agency Initiative (DAI). Additionally, he oversaw the formulation, execution, and financial reporting for over \$12 billion annually in Security Cooperation and Security Assistance resources. He served as the acting DSCA CIO for a nine month period, in which time he lead the divesture of the common Information Technology (IT) functions to the Washington Headquarters Services (WHS) and laid the ground work for improved governance and portfolio management capabilities for DSCA business systems.

Prior to joining DSCA, Mr. Harding served as the Assistant Director for Program and Budget within WHS, responsible for financial management support, to include performance management and analytical support, to Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD), WHS, and multiple Defense Agencies and miscellaneous organizations.

Mr. Harding began his federal career with the Department of Defense in 1994 as an IT professional. He later joined the private sector as a government IT contractor where his experience spanned a number of Federal Agencies to include the Department of Energy, Department of Health and Human Services, and the Department of Defense. Dak Hardwick currently serves as the Vice President, International Affairs at the Aerospace Industries Association (AIA). He oversees AIA's international policy and advocacy program on behalf of the U.S. aerospace and defense industry on issues including defense and commercial trade, industrial cooperation, technology security, and global supply chain to stakeholders around the world.

Before joining AIA, Hardwick worked at Harris Corporation, an international communications and information technology company. At Harris, he was the primary interface with the U.S. Government for government communication programs, including airspace modernization, intelligence, and meteorological ground system programs. Mrs. Michèle H. Hizon Deputy Director, Defense Technology Security Administration

Mrs. Michèle Hizon, a career member of the Senior Executive Service since 2015, is currently serving as the Deputy Director for the Defense Technology Security Administration (DTSA). In this capacity she assists the Director in managing a staff of over 190 policy analysts, engineers, licensing, and security officers responsible for developing and implementing DoD technology security and foreign disclosure policies for international transfers of defense-related goods, services, information, and technology.

Prior to her detail as the Acting Deputy Director, Mrs. Hizon served a one-year assignment as a Senior Advisor to the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Policy (China).

From 2015 to 2020 she served as the Principal Director of Security Assistance (SA) at the Defense Security Cooperation Agency (DSCA). She was responsible for the global execution of security assistance activities which include Foreign Military Sales; End Use Monitoring; and Title 22 training and equipping programs such as Excess Defense Articles, Special Defense Acquisition Fund, leases, and Foreign Military Financing.

Before this assignment, Mrs. Hizon was the Chief of Weapons at DSCA from 2011 to 2015. Her responsibilities included providing technical and doctrinal subject-matter expertise on weapons and systems, synchronizing interagency technology release efforts to support weapons sales, serving as the industry ombudsman for FMS, overseeing international FMS competitions, and developing the FMS Forecast. Mr. James Hursch Director, Defense Security Cooperation Agency

Mr. James A. Hursch, a career member of the Senior Executive Service, was appointed as Director of the Defense Security Cooperation Agency (DSCA) on January 2, 2022. DSCA's mission is to advance U.S. defense and foreign policy interests by building the capacity of U.S. allies and partner nations to respond to shared challenges. DSCA oversees Security Cooperation programs including: Foreign Military Sales, Foreign Military Financing, International Military Education and Training, and DoD Humanitarian Assistance. DSCA's component organizations include the Defense Institute of International Legal Studies, the Defense Security Cooperation University, and the Institute for Security Governance. The agency also serves as the Executive Agent for the six Department of Defense (DoD) Regional Centers for Security Studies.

Prior to joining DSCA, Mr. Hursch served as the Acting Secretary of Defense Representative in Europe and the Acting Defense Advisor for the U.S. Mission to

NATO. In this position, he was responsible for the formulation, coordination, and presentation of DoD policies to the U.S. Ambassador to NATO. Mr. Hursch assumed duties as Deputy Defense Advisor at the U.S. Mission in 2013.

Colonel Jason Kim Chief, Security Cooperation Office, American Institute in Taiwan


