

UNITED NATIONS MILITARY OBSERVERS COURSE (UNMO)

This course enhances the capacities of participating nations to train military officers for service as United Nations (UN) military observers in UN peacekeeping missions. This three-week course features a one-week field training exercise that entails significant host nation transportation, communications equipment, and mounted patrol training area requirements.

OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course, participants will be able to:

- Prepare officers for service as UN military observers.
- Understand major issues in modern peacekeeping operations (PKO).
- Apply observation, identification, investigation, and reporting techniques and procedures.
- Understand roles and responsibilities of local governments, civilian agencies, and other actors.
- ♦ Apply liaison, negotiation, and cultural awareness skills.
- Understand the UN Women, Peace, and Security agenda; Protection of Civilians (POC); and Counter Trafficking in Persons topics.

TOPICS

Daily instruction includes a variety of methodologies, including presentations, small-group activities, discussions, and a one-week field training exercise. Course topics may include:

- Introduction to UN Peacekeeping
- ♦ The legal framework for UN Peacekeeping
- ♦ Roles and responsibilities in the PKO environment
- Liaison, negotiation, and cultural awareness
- ♦ POC and Conflict-Related Sexual Violence (CRSV)
- UN verification and investigation techniques

PARTICIPANTS

Participant rank or grade should be equivalent to junior- to mid-level officers. Previous peacekeeping experience is desirable but not required. Preference is given to nominees with training responsibilities or officers serving with units earmarked for PKO deployment.
